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Grand Rapids Chapter AGOYO Recital at Westminster Presbyterian Church

The performers represent a diverse group of musicians studying and working in various denominations throughout West Michigan.

Organists Vincent Andrews, Alex Cross, John Deppe, Matthew Jakubisin, Jim Renfer, and Alexis VanZalen will offer a varied program of music on Westminster's 1937 Aeolian Skinner organ. Come celebrate the dedication of local young organists and enjoy their music in a historic downtown church.

The program begins at 7:00 p.m. on Monday October 17, 2022. Westminster Presbyterian Church is located at 47 Jefferson Ave SE in Grand Rapids. The parking lot and main entrance are off Jefferson Avenue, across from State Street.

Bernie Sanders Program - Report by Karen Howells

The Holland Chapter of the AGO met at Hope Church on Saturday September 17 to meet and listen to music composed by Bernie Sanders. (No, not that Bernie Sanders.) It was a very interesting and enjoyable time.

Bernie Sanders has recently retired from being an organist and composer living in Germany and is a member of the AGO Chapter of Europe.

Some interesting information we learned from Bernie included:

- *There are no electronic organs approved in Germany.
- *There is a high standard for organ builders in Europe with an organ building degree offered.
- *Organs built after WWII often used inferior material because that was what was available.
- *The Catholic Church of Germany has only one hymnal.
- *Hymnals for the Protestant and Catholic Churches attach an ecumenical symbol to songs sung by all congregations.
- *There is a "Church Tax" collected by the German tax system if one identifies as Catholic on the tax form. It is determined by one's income level, and amounts to about 7% and the State then gives the money to the church.
- *Paying the Church Tax then entitles one to certain services weddings, baptisms, funerals.
- *There are three levels of church musicians:

Level A - those who have a Masters degree

Level B - those with a Bachelors degree

Level C includes part time musicians

Each parish might have one full time musician (Levels A or B) with several part timers playing in the individual churches.

After talking with Bernie and asking him questions, Rhonda Edgington played several examples of Bernie's compositions. A recital of Mr. Sanders' music was then given on Sunday the 18th.

Notre Dame Graduate School Application Information - from Kola Owolabi

We are now accepting applications to our graduate program in sacred music for the 2023-24 academic year. Students in this program pursue a two-year master's degree in Sacred Music (concentrations in organ performance, choral conducting and voice) or a three-year Doctor of Musical Arts (concentrations in organ performance or choral conducting). Students also work closely with faculty in musicology, liturgical studies and theology. Our programs are broadly ecumenical, while giving specific attention to Roman Catholic traditions and practice.

We are extremely excited about what is going on here. The MSM students in organ performance play two recitals and the DMA students play three, one of which is a lecture recital. The studio meets weekly for an organ performance class, and the students have many opportunities to perform on campus. Students also take a four-semester sequence in creative hymn playing and organ improvisation.

All students receive full-tuition scholarships, health insurance, and an assistantship that supplies a generous stipend. Typically, an MSM organ student on an assistantship works in the Basilica of the Sacred Heart on campus, while DMA organ students are placed off campus in local churches. Our Fritts organ and Reyes Organ Hall are stunning. In addition, the Fritts organ in the Basilica of the Sacred Heart was dedicated in January 2017. With the opening of our music building, O'Neill Hall, our practice organs have increased to six, and in total we now have fifteen organs on campus. If you know of anyone who might be interested in applying, I am happy to hear from you. Alternatively, feel free to give the prospective student my email address and/or phone number. Undergraduate students are eligible for <u>full tuition scholarships</u>, and graduate & certificate students receive <u>full tuition waivers and generous stipends</u> through our graduate assistantship program in collaboration with major Atlanta churches.

Since the program reopened in 2019, students have hailed from the US, Korea, Russia and the Bahamas. One of my grad students was a semi-finalist in the most recent NYACOP competition at the Seattle convention.

Students have access to and performance opportunities on the many outstanding and diverse instruments in the city of Atlanta.
